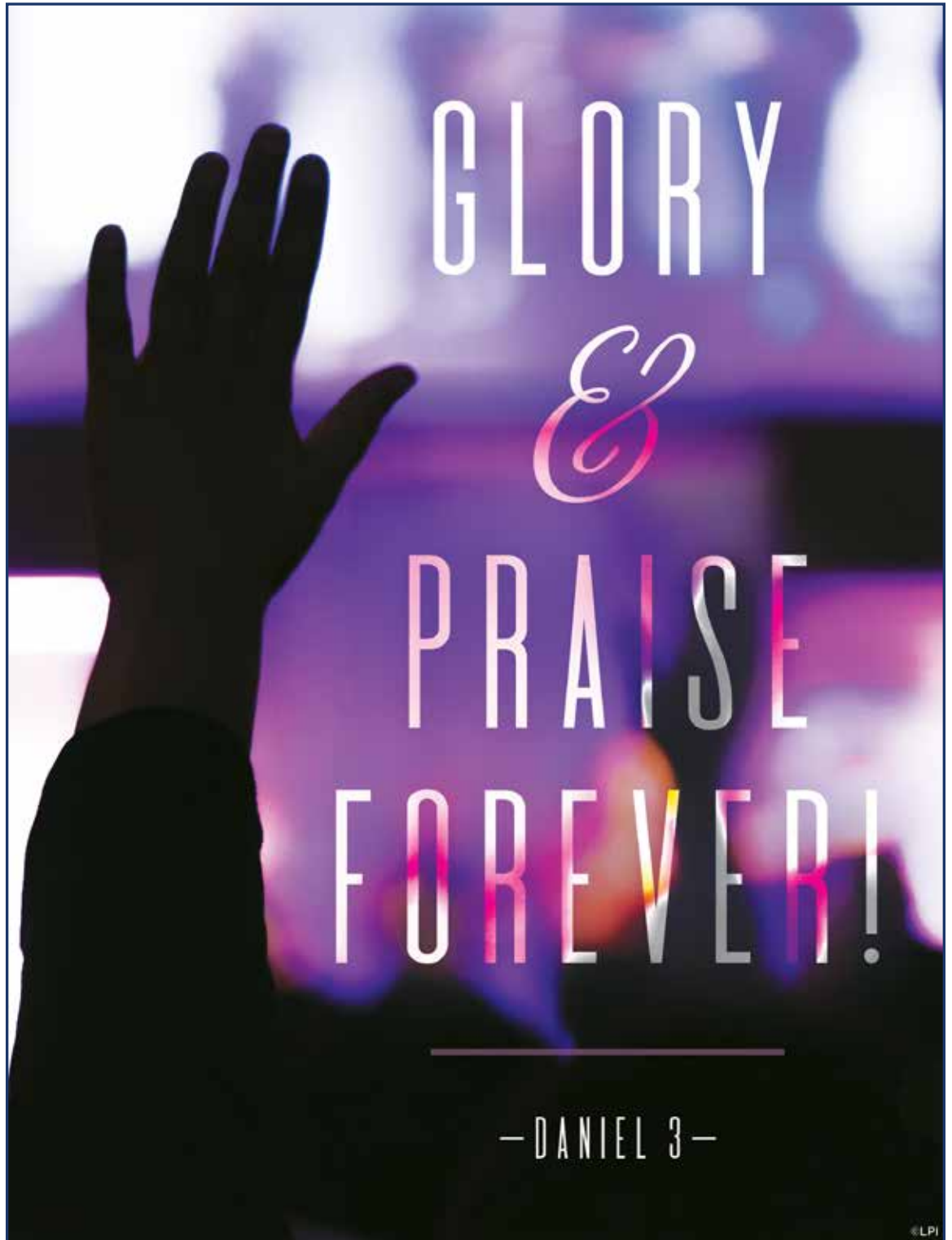

Thank you for making this journey with us! Over the last few weeks we've covered several components of prayer but here is the most important part: **be bold and start**. You may not feel totally comfortable with prayer, maybe you're not sure where to start...start anyway. Be awkward and vulnerable, be real with God. He loves you. In uncertainty, a great way to start prayer is like this: *"Come, Holy Spirit...I'm not sure what I'm doing, but I want to know and love you, teach me how to pray..."*

And when it comes to prayer, it's not about your eloquence or checking boxes, it's about letting God be God. It's about letting Him fight for you, be with you, love you and perfect you in His time. So, you're not alone in this. The Holy Spirit will pray through you and teach you. You just have to be bold and start.

# Elements of Mass

## Why is the priest wearing white again this weekend?

I thought that the Easter season was over!

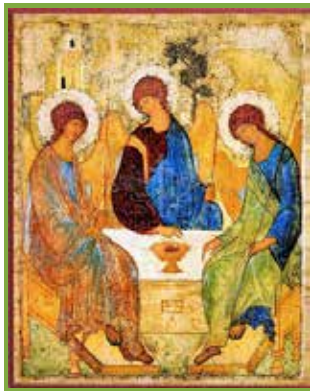
For a couple of weeks, the priest will get a reprieve from “wearin’ of the green” before we enter the long stretch of Sundays in Ordinary Time that lies ahead of us!

Every year, on the Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate Trinity Sunday, (officially named “The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity”) This is one of the few feasts of the Christian Year that celebrates a reality and doctrine rather than an event or person—and it celebrates one of the principle tenets of our faith: our belief in a Triune God!

While this is a special Sunday set aside to commemorate the sacred mystery—the union of Father, Son and Holy Spirit—as we worship together, take note of how often we articulate our belief in the Trinity. With the Sign of the Cross, the Gloria, the Profession of Faith, the Doxology at the end of the Eucharistic Prayer, and the blessing at the end of Mass—with each of these, at ANY Mass or any time we pray, we profess and celebrate our belief in one God in three divine persons.

From the earliest times, the concept of the “Trinity” is (to say the least!) challenging to understand. Sometimes, when words fall short, we can find visual enlightenment. It is said that St. Patrick used a three-leaf shamrock to illustrate the concept. Many a child has been taught about the Trinity using an apple: the protective skin (Father), the flesh that feeds us (Son), and the seeds that call forth new life (Spirit)

Rublev’s “Trinity” Icons, although painted, are not “paintings” in the tradition sense of the word. These religious images hover between two worlds, putting into color and shape that which cannot be grasped by the intellect. The icon in this room was inspired by a work by Russian iconographer Andrei Rublev. Many scholars consider this to be the most perfect icon ever painted.



The original work was created for the abbot of the Trinity Monastery in about 1410. Attempting to portray the Trinity, but aware of the current prohibition against depicting God, Rublev turned to the story of the hospitality of Abraham who was visited by three visitors as he camped by the oak of Mamre. These mysterious strangers joined Abraham for a meal and during the course of the conversation, it became clear that Abraham was talking directly to God; it seemed that the three “angels” were the three persons of the Trinity.

On one level, Rublev shows three angels seated around a table under Abraham's tree. But if you look deeper, the icon is a visual expression of the nature and relationship of the Trinity

Seated from left to right, we see God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Rublev gave each person different color clothing. The Holy Spirit, to the right, is clothed in the green and blue of earth and sky: the Spirit of creation moves in sky and water, breathes in heaven and earth—all living things owe freshness to the Spirit. The Son wears the reddish-brown of earth and the blue of heaven. In His being, heaven and earth are united, the nature of God and Man are present in Him. The Father wears a mantle of a color “not of this earth” (on the original, this appears to be transparent). The intent was that the color could not be described—and this is how it should be: no one has seen the Father, yet He fills the whole universe.

Notice how the persons are positioned. The Father looks ahead, hand raised slightly, toward the offering on the table. The movement of his head is toward the Son, the Son's head is inclined toward the Father --but looks to the Spirit, and the Spirit looks towards us. As Abraham invited the angels into his home, we too are invited to the empty place on the near side of the table or altar, to enter this perfect communion and so complete this circle of love.
