The need for quality affordable housing has not slowed down during the last few months and Milwaukee's Habitat for Humanity continues its mission to address that need. This year we will complete the three year Midtown 100 plan.

The Church Coalition, of which Christ King is one of five local church members, will begin framing a new house in August. Over the next year we will construct this house from framing to the last coat of paint. And we need help to accomplish this.

Volunteers between the ages of 18 and 64 are needed. (Later in the year they hope to welcome back those 65 and over.) No formal skills are needed, just the eagerness to learn. All tools and safety equipment are provided. Strict Covid protocol will be followed. Our volunteer groups will be limited to 5 people in addition to the 2 regular Habitat people.

The 2020 Church Coalition House will be located at 2235 N. 24th Place, Milwaukee. Eleven work days have been set: August 15, August 19-22 and August 26-29. Work days go from 8:15 a.m to 3:15 p.m.

If you don't swing a hammer, but you can make a sandwich, we can use your help too! Volunteers are needed to bring a hardy lunch for 8 -10 people for each of our work days.

TELL ME A STORY

Every year, when my family gathers for Thanksgiving dinner, we sit around the dining room table and swap stories. More often than not, we retell the same stories year after year: the story of how Grammy met Pop, the story of how a family business came to be, the story of how father got into trouble for drag racing down Santa Monica Blvd.—stories that happened before most of us were born.

But it's the story of our family: how it came to be, how it thrived, how it got into—and out of—trouble!! And in retelling these stories, we make them present again. The Jewish people even have a word for this—*zikkaron*—and this concept underpins most Jewish celebrations AND our celebration of the Eucharist! When we gather at Mass, we make present again the stories (sacred Scripture) that we inherited; we reconnect with who we are, and knowing who we are requires knowing where we came from! These “roots” give context to help us to better understand ourselves and provide a basis from which to move forward with confidence and courage.

One of the very important things to come out of Vatican II is the rediscovery of the importance of the word of God. Thus whenever the Church gathers, not just for Mass but also for every sacrament and for every order of blessing, the book containing the living word of God being opened and read. This reinforces the wonderful reality that we can do nothing—we can't move forward—until we hear the word of God proclaimed. And when the word of God is proclaimed in the midst of the assembly, God himself speaks!!

First Reading

Once the Introductory Rites are completed, we are prepared to hear the word of God and are seated for the Liturgy of the Word.

Elements of Mass

The reader approaches the ambo—the Table of the Word, and begins the First Reading. This reading is drawn from the Old Testament, except during the Easter season, when we hear from passages from the Acts of the Apostles. It can be taken from the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Bible, often referred to as the “Book of Moses” or “the Law” by our Jewish brothers and sisters), it can be taken from one of the prophets (such as Isaiah or Jeremiah) or one of the historical books (Chronicles, and the books of Samuel and Kings are examples of these). But whatever the source, it shows us the focus that the Liturgy of the Word is going to take and is the reading most closely connected to the Gospel in theme and imagery.

When I hear the Hebrew Scriptures, I often envision the two travelers who encountered the risen Jesus on the Road to Emmaus, hearing how these ancient words have been fulfilled and acting as stepping-stones that lead us to our risen Lord!

Responsible Psalm


The cantor now steps to the ambo to leads us in the responsorial psalm. These are taken (as you might guess!!) from the Book of Psalms. These ancient hymns are actually along the lines of early “folk songs” of the people of Israel! Meant to be sung, they express sadness, longing, trust, praise and thanksgiving to God. The psalm were daily fare for the Jewish people and it is remarkable to note that Jesus himself would have sung them!! The psalm is generally connected to the First Reading in tone and theme and serves as to link to the Gospel.

Second Reading

After the psalm, a reader steps forward once again to ambo to proclaim the Second Reading.

While the first reading is connected to the gospel and the psalm is connected to the first reading, the second reading usually isn't connected to anything! This reading is taken from the New Testament: from one of the epistles (letter of guidance or instruction to the early Christians), the Acts of the Apostles (recounting the earliest days of the Church), or the Book of Revelation (a prophetic vision of describing the fulfillment of the reign of God). In this reading, we get to hear of the early Christian communities struggling to get along with one another, grappling with the mysteries of their faith, and striving to be good disciples—themes that resonate with us TODAY!!

The second reading concludes — there is a moment of silence — and we stand to greet the Gospel...



YOUTH MINISTRY FORMATION

Before our parishioners graduate high school, we want them to seek out life's big questions and encounter Jesus Christ in the answers, to have an authentic connection with mentors, peers, and the Catholic Church through small groups, and to be equipped with the Holy Spirit through Confirmation. Sustained on daily prayer, the sacraments, and a desire for holiness, our graduates will be sent out to the world as missionaries and disciples.

Many teens and young adults leave the Church because they feel out of place or they struggle with the Church's teachings. But most leave because they never had an encounter with the Trinity. Christianity is so much more than ethics and routine - it's about mission, adventure, boldness, worship, holiness, and discovering who God is and who He is calling you to be. Can you imagine what our parish would be like if every one of our teens experienced the Trinity in that way? Let's find out...

Before they graduate high school, we want each teen to have the opportunity to:

Seek

At Alpha, ask and discuss life's biggest questions in an honest, respectful environment; meet new friends, hear the Gospel message and have the chance to respond.

Connect

Get connected to the parish and peers in a small group. This group of 6-8 students (same gender/grade) and one leader will ideally meet together for a few years. Students will get to choose the topics they want to study in light of Scripture and Church teaching.

Equip

Be equipped to go out and "set the world on fire" (St. Catherine of Siena) through the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Send

Lead in our parish, and/or join a special small group to help you prepare for college and beyond by learning how to defend the faith, how to pray in new ways, and preach the Gospel.


ENROLLING 3K-GRADE 8



HOW CAN WE HELP?

Sacraments:

Infant Baptism

Baptism is an initiation into a new life of discipleship and access to the full spiritual riches of the Church. The parish rejoices at the gift of new life and seeks to assist you in this mission as parents, starting with the sacramental grace of Baptism. Preparation sessions are held regularly among our tri-parish collaborative relationship. For the convenience of parents, we encourage you to begin preparation prior to the birth of the child. Baptisms are celebrated on particular Sundays of the month either during Mass or after Mass. Contact the parish office for details.

Marriage

The grace proper to the Sacrament of Matrimony is intended to perfect the love of a couple and to strengthen their indissoluble unity. By this grace, they help one another to attain holiness in their married life and in welcoming and educating their children. Our parish rejoices at the gift of marriage. Contact the parish priests or the parish office as soon as possible prior to planning a wedding, so as to allow the support and preparation process the Church provides to future married couples.

Anointing of the Sick

Anointing of the Sick is a powerful sacrament of healing for one's body and soul. It can be requested any time, most conveniently after a Sunday Mass. Contact the celebrant to request this sacrament. The parish priests may be contacted directly to celebrate this sacrament by appointment as well.
